2018 will be our 7th Annual Spring Garden Tour. If you have not attended one of our garden tours, you may like to consider making a day of it next summer. It is a one day self-guided tour of five or six gardens. We strive to make this day a real community event by involving local eateries, artists and musicians. It is also a great opportunity to ask a gardener for tips and for ides of what to do in your own garden space.

The 2018 tour will be in the Garden Valley area. The western most garden next summer is on San Souci Drive, and at the time of this writing the eastern most is on Old Garden Valley Road, half way to River Forks Park.

Our goal in setting up these gardens is to include gardens of varying sizes, unusual concepts, and interesting layouts.

One of the 2018 gardens is a low-moisture garden; clever arrangements of rock, shrubs, potted plants, and a Bottle Tree or two! This particular gardener designs her various beds and vistas from views out the windows of her home, and she invites you to take a step inside to see what you think! (She happens to be a collector of all things vintage, and her home is a veritable display case!)

Another garden is unique in that miniature versions of some classic plants are used in a rather extensive Miniature Asian Garden! Around the corner and up a small incline this same gardener has a Hobbit Garden. The artist at this location will be selling *fairy houses*, as were

sold on the 2016 tour.

There is always something interesting and fun going on during the League's Annual Spring Garden Tour so, bring a friend or a family member, give a ticket as a **Mother's Day** gift, and if you're not a gardener, come to enjoy the music and do some early Christmas shopping from our local artists!

BLUE ZONES PROJECT

LWVUV member, Juliete Palenshus, was recently hired to serve as Engagement Lead of the Blue Zones Project®-Umpqua. Blue Zones Project is a nationally respected, community-led well-being improvement initiative designed to make healthy choices easier through permanent changes to a city's environment, policy, and social networks.



Established in 2010, Blue Zones Project is inspired by Dan Buettner, a National Geographic Fellow and *New York Times* best-selling author who identified five regions of the world—Blue Zones®—with the highest concentration of people living to 100 years or older. Blue Zones Project incorporates Buettner's findings and works with cities to implement policies and programs that will move a community toward optimal health and

well-being. Currently, 42 communities in nine states have joined Blue Zones Project, impacting more than 3.3 million Americans nationwide.

In April of this year Umpqua, along with Grants Pass and The Dalles, were named Blue Zones Project Demonstration Communities. Currently the Umpqua team is focused on guiding strategic planning, setting up a volunteer governance structure, and conducting early awareness-building efforts. Implementation activities will begin in the late fall.

Graduating with honors from Central Washington University, Juliete earned a degree in International Relations, with minors in Spanish, Latin American Studies, and Environmental Studies. Her professional background includes government, social services, and nonprofit management. Her commitment toward the achievement of a vibrant and thriving community has been demonstrated in her civic roles. She served as a champion for health as the executive director of UC-VEG and as a community advisory councilor for Umpqua Health Alliance. She is

currently serving on the Umpqua Valley Arts Association board of directors and the NeighborWorks Umpqua marketing committee and is also the chair of the Summer Arts Festival. Last year, she ran for Roseburg City Council in Ward 3 on a platform that integrated many of the health and wellness strategies she learned from Blue Zones areas.

Juliete will apply her community engagement skills to Blue Zones Project, focusing on driving communication efforts for the initiative while managing activities that inspire people to engage with Blue Zones Project practices and resources. She is thrilled to contribute her 16-year background in philanthropic efforts to her new position.

In order to become a certified Blue Zones Demonstration Community, a community must adopt a critical mass of policies and projects in three policy areas: Built Environment, Food Policy, and Tobacco/Smoking Environment. In the next few months, Blue Zones Project-Umpqua will convene policy summits hosted by national policy experts. Following each gathering, the facilitator will gather the priorities selected by the stakeholders in attendance to create a report that will guide the work of the initiative. You are all encouraged to attend and share your local expertise and experience.
